

Current Opportunities to Get Involved With:

PARAMEDIC 3

The aim of PARAMEDIC3 is to determine the clinical and cost-effectiveness of IO access versus IV access in out-of-hospital cardiac arrests.



EEAST is collaborating with selected hospitals across Essex, Suffolk, Norfolk, and Cambridgeshire, and is now live with:

West Suffolk Hospital Broomfield Ipswich Basildon Colchester Southend

Joining soon is James Paget hospital, Great Yarmouth (and there will be more sites to follow).

RAPID2



EEAST will be taking part in the RAPID2 study
which aims to test the safety, clinical and cost-effectiveness of
Paramedics providing fascia iliaca compartment block (FICB) as pain
relief to patients with suspected hip fractures in the prehospital
environment.

Waveney Paramedics have now begun their FICB training supported by a team of James Paget Hospital anaesthetists.

In March we have the Site Initiation Visit where the Sponsor (Swansea University) will visit EEAST to deliver essential training to the research teams and ensure arrangements are in place for patient recruitment to begin.

VITALS

The key aim of the Vitamin D Ambulance Wellbeing
Study (VITALS) was to determine the incidence of vitamin D deficiency in shift and indoor-workers across the EEAST workforce.

With the support of EEAST Charitable Funds, we have tested over 400 staff across the Trust.

Our initial findings are:

- Almost half of staff sampled (46%) were found to have insufficient vitamin D levels (between 50 and 25nmol/L)
- 6% of staff sampled were found to be vitamin D deficient (less than 25nmol/L).
- The sample vitamin D range was 10.3 139.5nmol/L.
- 15% of those sampled had previously been diagnosed with vitamin D insufficiency/deficiency.
- Ambulance Operations Centre workers, under 25s, smokers, fair or very fair skin tone and those describing themselves as not 'White British' were associated with an increased risk of insufficiency.
- The menopause or andropause, ethnicity not 'White British' and vegetarian or vegan diet were associated with an increased risk of deficiency.

We are currently preparing the VITALS Final Report and we will share it as soon as possible.

EVOLVED



We have obtained a College of Paramedics small grant award to interview VITALS participants who were found to be sufficient and deficient in blood vitamin D.

The aim of EVOLVED is to understand staff behaviours and lifestyle factors, as well as exploring the impacts this has on personal and professional wellbeing.

Updates to Current Studies:

CESSATION



CESSATION Update... We have now interviewed 21 women experiencing the menopause transition. Ten themes were identified: impact on work role, awareness and preparedness for menopause transition, personal impact of symptoms, desired support, appropriate sickness and menopause policy, managerial development, compassion and dignity, impact of working environment, impact on safety, lack of choice. Lack of understanding and support from colleagues and line managers were identified as the key issues.

We are currently preparing the CESSATION findings for publication in the British Paramedic Journal - look out for updates! – and planning a stakeholder panel to decide the next steps for this work.


KARMA2



KARMA2 is exploring whether ambulance clinicians can reliably and safely use capillary blood ketone meters to identify high-risk DKA patients and administer fluid therapy.

The KARMA2 Final Report is currently being prepared and the findings will be shared as soon as possible. They are already being used to update the current JRCALC Glycaemic Emergencies Clinical Guidelines.

EEAST were a control site for the SEE-IT trial during
June to November 2022. This trial tested the use of live
streaming from the scene of trauma incidents via 999 callers' smartphones

'Paramedic Decision Making in out of hospital Cardiac arrest 2' closed for recruitment in November. 128 Paramedics shared their views. We were the third highest recruiting ambulance Trust! Thank-you to Paramedics who took part! The publication of the report should be available soon.

CATNAPS STUDY

CATNAPS is a national research study exploring how fatigue can be managed in the NHS ambulance workforce and the best ways to support staff to sleep better. It aims to develop a new approach to fatigue management that meets the needs of staff and operations and is most likely to improve patient and staff safety.

NHS Staff Retention in a Post COVID-19 World

CRASH-4

Sponsored by the London School of Hygiene and Tropical medicine in collaboration with hospitals and ambulance Trusts across the UK. CRASH-4 is exploring the use of Tranexamic acid in older patients with traumatic head injuries.
